2024 MIPS Black History Month Essay & Trivia Contest

Official Contest Rules

ELIGIBILITY:

This contest is open to all New Jersey high school students (grades 9 - 12). There is no entry fee for this contest. All entries must be written in English and submitted online as a PDF file or Microsoft Word document. (See [Essay Format](#))

HOW TO ENTER:

Write a 1500-word essay answering based on the following essay topic and questions:

On May 17, 1954, in *Brown v. Board of Education* the United States Supreme Court found racial segregation in public schools unconstitutional. Now, almost 70 years later, the issue is being litigated in New Jersey. The Latino Action Network, the NAACP New Jersey State Conference and others recently sued the State of New Jersey for violating the New Jersey Constitution and other statutes for failing to desegregate New Jersey's schools. The lawsuit claims that New Jersey's schools are among the most segregated in the nation. Citing that in the 674 public school districts serving 1.3 million students, about 585,000 Black and Latino students attend public schools with student populations that are more than 75% non-white. More than half of those students attend schools that are more than 90% non-white.

- A. Is racial school segregation a problem in New Jersey? If not, why not? If you believe it is, explain why and its implications for students. Discuss whether parents and children should have a choice in where they attend school and the possible remedies for addressing the segregation issue.
- B. In addressing these questions, you may consider the November 2017, report entitled "*New Jersey's Segregated Schools Trends and Paths Forward*"; and the October 6, 2023, opinion of New Jersey Superior Court Judge Robert Lougy concerning the Latino Action Network v. New Jersey Board of Education and the *Brown v. Board of Education* decision. Please note that you are not limited to these resources.

Students must register and submit your essay online at njsba.com as a PDF or Word document (See [Essay Format](#)). Only one submission is allowed per student.

ESSAY SUBMISSION DEADLINE AND DETAILS:

All essays must be received by 11:59p.m. **January 24**

ESSAY FORMAT

All Essays will be judged without knowledge of the identity of the author.

- The essay must be written in English.
- The title of the essay should appear at the top of page one; further pages should be numbered on the top right; the **student's name must not appear on the essay.**
- The essay must be in MLA format (double-spaced in a 12-point font, with one-inch margins on all sides of each page).
- The essay must be no more than 3 pages in length (or 1500 words), not including the Works Cited page.
- Essay must be saved as a Word Document or PDF file.
- Google Docs will not be accepted.*

***Google Docs should be saved as a Word or PDF document prior to submission. To do so, choose File/Download and select "PDF Document" or "Microsoft Word."**

JUDGING CRITERIA:

Essays will be reviewed anonymously by a select panel of judges for the NJSBA Minorities in the Profession Section, based on the following criteria:

- Point of view (clearly stated and well-supported)
- Quality of writing (spelling, grammar, punctuation)
- Creativity and meaningful response (use of critical and creative thinking)
- Adherence to specific limitations (3 pages or 1500 words or less)

QUALIFYING ESSAY / WINNER NOTIFICATIONS:

Three essay finalists and two runners-up will be notified by email and/or phone on **February 16**.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROGRAM

Essay finalists and runners-up are invited to the New Jersey Law Center to read a selection from their essay of their choosing and briefly talk about how they came to their argument and what they will take forward from the experience.

STUDENT CONFIRMATION DEADLINE FOR TRIVIA CONTEST

All essay finalists must confirm their attendance and availability to read a selection of their essay and discuss by **February 16** or within 5 days of notification.

AWARD RECEPTION

All essay finalists are invited to attend the 2024 MIPS Black History Month Award Reception on **February 22** at 6 p.m. An invitation will be sent to the email address provided with the student's essay submission.

PRIZES:

A total of \$1500 in cash prizes will be awarded to five students as follows:

Essay Contest Awards

1st Place \$500

2nd Place \$400

3rd Place \$300

Honorable Mentions (Unranked Essay Winners/Runners-up)

1st and 2nd runners-up will be awarded \$150 as honorable mentions.
