News and Notices from the Courts

- The Judiciary issued <u>two new forms</u> to be used statewide in all Family Court dockets when the court appoints a guardian ad litem for minor children.
- The state Supreme Court invites <u>written</u> <u>comments</u> on whether New Jersey should adopt the NextGen exam as a replacement for the state's existing bar examination format. Comments are due by July 7.
- The U.S. District Court for the District of New Jersey has launched a learning center <u>website</u> to increase civic knowledge, promote active citizenship and provide accessible resources for educators and students.



Supreme Court and Appellate Decisions

- <u>M.A. v. J.H.M. (Passaic County and Statewide)</u>— The Supreme Court ruled that a defendant in a Prevention of Domestic Violence Act final restraining order may invoke the privilege against self-incrimination in response to specific questions that raise reasonable risks of selfincrimination, and when no adverse inference may be drawn from the exercise of that right.
- In re Opinion No. 735 of the Supreme Court Advisory Committee on Professional Ethics— The Court found that the practice of purchasing a competitor's name as a keyword does not constitute a violation of the RPCs. However, the Court required that attorneys employing this

- <u>State of New Jersey vs. Jakil J. Bryant</u> (<u>Middlesex County and Statewide</u>)—The defendant appealed the denial of his motion to suppress a gun that police found after opening his companion's backpack without a search warrant.
- <u>State of New Jersey vs. K.H. (Atlantic County</u> <u>and Statewide)</u>—The Appellate Division affirmed the defendant's convictions for aggravated sexual assault and burglary but vacated his extended-term sentence as a persistent offender because his eligibility for the extended term must be decided by a jury, not a judge.
- <u>State of New Jersey vs. Maurice E. Johnson</u> (<u>Cumberland County and Statewide</u>)—The Appellate Division considered a novel constitutional question arising from the execution of a communications data warrant that authorized the surreptitious installation of a global positioning system device on a vehicle to electronically monitor its movements.
- <u>Allen J. Satz vs. Keshet Starr (Bergen County</u> <u>and Statewide)</u>—A case involving a plaintiff who sued defendants after they circulated a flyer advocating he give his wife a religious divorce.
- <u>Pamela J. Graziadei vs. Capital Health Systems,</u> <u>Inc. (Mercer County and Statewide)</u>—A nurse and acknowledged alcoholic filed a complaint in the Law Division alleging defendants discriminated against her because of her alcoholism, and an amended complaint alleging defendants retaliated against her for filing the complaint, in violation of the New Jersey Law Against Discrimination.
